Cued Speech in Devon

Cued Speech use at the Exeter Royal Academy for Deaf Education (ERADE), is developing after more extremely good literacy and phonic awareness results. Cate Calder, the Cued Speech Association Educational Development Officer, works part-time at ERADE. Cate is planning to create a series of videoed cued stories to develop the students' knowledge and understanding of the English language.

Meanwhile Cate has started a new part-time, temporary, Devon-wide post for the local peripatetic service supporting Cued Speech-using families at home and professionals and children in schools. She will be both teaching Cued Speech and demonstrating ways in which it can be used.

Our 9th Summer School

The Summer School at the Exeter Royal Academy for Deaf Education (ERADE) was well attended with students from the UK and overseas, the furthest travelling from Poland and others coming from The Netherlands, France and Switzerland.

Classes for adults

There were 3 levels of classes on offer - Foundation for beginners, Improvers for those with some knowledge of Cued Speech and the Advanced group.

In addition a French Cuers' class ran for those who already cue in French but who want to improve their English cueing.

At the end of the week some of the students took exams in Cued Speech Proficiency; four people passed level one and five people passed level two. Well done to all!

Presentations

In addition to the classes this year there was also a day of presentations:

- on groundbreaking Cued Speech work at ERADE with older signing deaf pupils
- on using Cued Speech in speech and language therapy sessions
- on how Cued Speech use fits with language acquisition, literacy and speech
- on how Cued Speech is used to give access to both English and French
- by parents who use Cued Speech within the family
- from a profoundly deaf adult who grew up with Cued Speech.

Running in parallel with the presentations were cueing workshops for students who preferred to continue to work on their practical skills.

Children's class

Whilst our main aim is to teach adults, (who then go on to use Cued Speech with children) at the Summer School we also offer children and young people (both deaf and hearing) the opportunity to learn the basics of Cued Speech in a fun, activity-based environment.

One of the week's activities was working together to create and cue a short cabaret sketch which the students performed on the final night. This year their show was a magnificent horror drama!

The children all had a great time, and some are already talking about coming back next year.

sketch that they had put together over the course of the week.



Social announcements were made available to all by Cued Speech transliteration in French and English, and translation in BSL and Dutch sign language (see photo opposite).

Learn to cue Some of our courses are designed to incorporate home study using our e-learning website: www.learntocue.co.uk. Others are stand alone courses requiring no additional work from home. simple sound-based system
comprising eight handshapes,
used in four positions
near the mouth,
in conjunction with
the lip patterns of normal speech
so as to make
all the sounds of spoken language
fully comprehensible to
deaf and hearing-impaired people.
